Kauhale Preserve Introduction

- Have students listen to the English narrations about the preserve as well as mo'olelo {stories} told of Kupuna Eatons growing up in the area.
 - You can also play the Hawaiian narrations for students so they can hear some of the Hawaiian language.

Instructional Sequence

Teacher Does	Students Do
Prior to visiting Kauhale for a huaka'i, the teacher will preview the slides and expectations for the Huaka'i- Plant identification (Scavenger Hunt) (Link:	Students will ask any questions they may have about the task while they are on the huaka'i.
https://cutt.ly/GH7hpX1; digital or hard copy) **Lesson has been designed to be used on an iPad. Modifications (printed) can be made as needed.	Disclaimer: Some plants might change location on the path as nature runs its own course.
Upon arriving at Kauhale, the teacher will pass out picture cards provided by Kauhale. Teachers may choose to partner up or create small groups of students for the task. (*Ask Kauhale staff what is best for them)	Students will listen attentively to the presenters at Kauhale. Listening for information they can use to add to their scavenger hunt activities.
Teachers assist Kauhale staff and students as they tour the trail at Kauhale looking at all the plants.	Students will: • Slide 1- Dragging pictures of the native

	plants to where they are located on the Kauhale trail Slide 2- As the plants are located on the trail, students are to listen to the Kauhale staff as they talk about the uses of each plant. The uses will be noted on slide 2.
At the end of the trail tour, the teacher will draw the student's attention to slides 3-4 (Native Plant Research)	Students will: Slide 3-Choose a plant found on the trail and take a photo of the plant Slide 4- Write notes about the plant Asking Kauhale staff any further questions.

Closure

- 1. After lunch/upon arrival back at school (or the next day), have students complete the Post Huaka'i Evaluation (slides 5-6). Students will reflect on their learning from the field trip.
- 2. Field Trip Narrative Writing- Why is Kauhale Preserve (and places like it) so important to preserve & maintain?

Suggested Formative Assessment Method/s For This Lesson

- Part 1: Post Huaka'i Evaluation (slides 5-6)
 - How did the native Hawaiian plants we saw today get to Hawai'i?
 - What was the most interesting thing you learned today?
 - What did you like best about the field trip today?
 - If you could improve today's field trip, how would you make it better?
- Part 2: Native Plant Research (See lesson 3 below)
- Optional Assessment- As a closing activity/continued learning, the teacher can obtain a native plant
 as a classroom plant/project. Students will be responsible for the malama and growing of the plant. If
 Kauhale Preserve is unable to provide a small plant, you may also reach out to Mālama Learning
 Center for help. A classroom garden could be started in a few short years!

Explain How This Lesson Relates To the Unit Summative Assessment

This huaka'i will give students the first hand experience at seeing and learning about various native Hawaiian plants. Students will see the plants in their natural habitat. Learn about the uses of the plant from expert educators at Kauhale. Students will take back this vital information and complete a researched informational writing piece about a plant of their choice.
