
Lesson Title: What Does It Mean to Be Self-Sustaining?

Essential Unit Questions Addressed:

- 1. Is it important/beneficial to be self-sustaining?
- 2. How can the people of Honouliuli become more self-sustaining and better stewards of our ahupua'a?

Pedagogy

Lesson Introduction

Teacher will play the video, "Where you are," from Moana (available via the following URL: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=RTWhvp_OD6s</u>) and discuss: 1. How the video relates to self-sustenance, 2. What kinds of things do people need to be self-sustaining? (make a list as a class).

Teacher Does	Students Do
Split the class into 3 groups and direct each to watch one of the following video sets providing the links via Google Classroom or similar platform: Direct each group to points from the video/s that are important additions to the class list on what it takes to be self-sustaining	Students watch videos and record points from the video/s that are important additions to the class list on what it takes to be self-sustainingit is recommended that students be allowed to work individually or in groups of 2-3

 Direct students to add points to the class list on what it takes to be self-sustaining, they may also add an important detail to a previously made point Direct each individual student to start prioritizing the class list on their own paper, based on their own opinion 	Students add points from their video viewing and start creating a prioritized list as individuals.

Teacher Does	Students Do
Ask students to discuss how many of the self-sustaining points they observe in their own ahupua`a today and share their prioritized lists of what should be in place/practice to be self-sustaining	Students respond to the prompt in pairs then after 5 minutes, pair/square
Prompt the groups of 4 from the pair/square discussion to complete the activity posted on the Google Classroom available via the following URL: <u>https://cutt.ly/JKIbk90</u>	Students will work on the activity for approximately 15 minutes

Lesson Closure

Each student will write a rough draft short paragraph response on their own stating their opinion in regards to this question and why.
