- The Hoakalei Cultural Foundation was established in 2006 to ensure good stewardship of the land and heritage of the 'Ewa Plain. Its vision is to enable future generations to understand, value and respect the spirit, natural resources and heritage of the 'Ewa Plain and most importantly, to use it to guide their lives.
- The Foundation provides oversight of work to make archaeological sites within the Hoakalei Resort accessible to the community, and is actively creating partnerships with area schools and other groups to pass on knowledge from one generation to the next.
- Guided by the legacy of the Foundation's founders, Kupuna Arline Wainaha Kuuleialoha Brede Eaton and Kupuna Mary Kaipo Malama Serrao, board members, 'ohana and community members work to fulfill the Foundation's mission.
- Hoakalei is home to three preservation areas with oversight provided by the Foundation: the Kauhale,
 Ahu and Kuapapa Preserves. The Kauhale Preserve includes a federally protected Wetland
 Preservation Area, which provides vital nesting grounds for the endangered Ae'o (Hawaiian Stilt), 'Alae
 Ke'oke'o (Hawaiian Coot) and Koloa Maoli (Hawaiian Duck). The Foundation plans to open a cultural
 center on the mauka end of the Kauhale Preserve where it will offer place-based educational programs
 to students, residents and visitors.

Restoration Work

- Removing invasive vegetation where needed
- Planting native limu along the coast (using lei limu kala & pōhaku)
- Creating an educational hale and hale wa`a are part of future plans

Site Features

- There is a public restroom nearby at One'ula Beach park (currently there is one porta-potty on site)
- Often visiting classes are split into two groups one in the Kauhale area and one to the shoreline/limu
 learning areas...when bus transportation requires groups to leave early, it's a bit of a challenge but they
 have adapted. They can accommodate up to 80 students.
- Visiting teachers can communicate with the site hosts to develop a visit by choosing from a wide variety
 of activities, including `Ōlelo Hawai`i immersion. Possible learning activities include creating lei with the
 mea kanu (native plants/limu) of that place and have students take it home with them. Other activities
 include limu press, plant press, native plant mana`o and seed collection.
- There are beautiful hale interpretive signs as well as plant species signs...several of the larger signs have QR codes to the website so visitors may hear mana'o from recordings in both English and 'Ōlelo Hawai'i.
